

Year 11 GCSE Mock Exams – The Time to Prepare is Now!

Every year we hold two sets of mock exams for Year 11 to prepare them for their summer exams. These mock exams are carried out in the same style as real exams and give students a chance to prepare for exams and to 'feel' what an exam setting is like. This is also very important for teachers, as we get a chance to see the students performing at their best and therefore be able to provide the best feedback and support to improve. Therefore, it is very important that students are best prepared for their mock exams. If you have a child in Year 11, they are likely to be undertaking mock exams in all their exam subjects in the week after we return from half term (WB 4/11/24), so they need to start preparing now!





Changes to Buses After School

As you will be aware, many of our students take the bus home from school. The buses are run by a private company, Stagecoach, who send the buses to the front of the school for 3.25pm as a special service.

After school, the following busses come to collect students from outside the school gate:

- 5 to Morecambe
- 5 to Overton
- 55 to Lancaster
- 445 to Brookhouse
- 51 to Silverdale

Until the start of this academic year, Stagecoach sent two 55 buses (a double decker and a single decker), both of which went all the way to the Lancaster Bus Station. They have now informed us that **they will only be sending one double decker 55 to Lancaster**. They are still sending a single 55, but it will only go as far as Bolton-le-Sands.

If your child(ren) usually get the 55 home, please speak to them about which bus is best for them. The bus company would like us to direct the students who only take the bus as far as Bolton-le-Sands to wait and get on the single decker, in order to make sure that there is enough space on the double decker for those who need it.

Teacher Training on INSET Day 2

In every school, there are 195 school days in a year. 190 days are assigned as teaching days and all schools provide 5 IN SErvice Training (INSET) days for their staff. At Carnforth High School, our first day of the academic year is always a key INSET Day as new and returning staff receive key information and training to start the year. On our second INSET Day, which took place on Friday 27th September, we continued to train our staff to make sure that all our students are safe, happy and receiving the best teaching and learning experiences in school. We thought you might like to hear what we were up to!

In the morning all staff had a key presentation to develop their safeguarding skills; this helps us to best identify, report and provide support when we have any concerns about our students. All staff also undertook training around 'Adaptive Teaching,' a classroom approach that aims to make sure that teachers of aware of all the individual needs of each student to best support them learning. We also had a 'carousel' of short training sessions, in which staff undertook training around assessing students in lessons, providing models using iPads, teaching literacy using our RISE sessions, identify SEN needs in students to provide them with support, and the best ways to use some of our school software, including our CPOMS reporting software and the ClassCharts software we use for recording positive points and setting homework.



New Attendance Email Address

Starting on Monday, Carnforth High School has a new <u>Attendance/Absence</u> email address which can be used to report absences from school. The email address can also be used for sending medical evidence for any appointments your child may have during the school day; these can be screenshots or pictures of medical letters or appointment cards stating clearly the student's name and the time and date of the appointment. Please email the student's name, form and a clear reason for absence to:

attendance@carnforthhigh.co.uk

Government guidelines state that parents and carers are required to contact school **every day of absence** unless agreed in advance by a member of staff. If we do not receive contact from a parent/carer regarding a child's absence, this will be recorded as an unauthorised absence. This leads to a drop in your child's attendance percentage and over time could result in prosecution proceedings. If a child is unwell and unable to attend school for three consecutive days, then school advise that parents take their child to see their GP for further investigation.

If your child has an appointment during the school day, we strongly encourage that your child attends school before and/or after the appointment, so that they do not miss out on learning.


PLANS IN PLACE

New Careers Advisor at CHS

This year we are working with Career North to provide a key part of our Career Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) offer to our students. As part of this, our new Career Advisor, Carl Brown, will be in school each week. This half term, Carl will be focussing on speaking to Year 11 students in one-to-one guidance meetings. These have already begun, and Carl will see 8 students each day he's in.



After a guidance meeting, Carl uploads an individual Action Plan for the student to their Unifrog account. **They can find it by logging in to their Unifrog account** (you can find a guide for this, and other Careers information on our Careers page here: <u>https://www.carnforthhigh.co.uk/school-life/careers/</u>) and looking in their personal 'locker' area:

College Open Events



Table Tennis Fixtures

James was the standout performer winning 4 out of his 6 games. Each game was made up of 3 sets, first to 11 points. It was great to see the students, who are footballers and netballers by trade, experiencing and competing in a different sport. The following week we welcomed Morecambe Bay Academy for a year 8/9 fixture. This time we had 12 students representing school - Jacob, Oliver, Theo, Charlie, Oliver, Alfie, Jack, Joseph, Lexi, Ava and Paige. Each student was placed into a pair, and they played doubles matches vs Morecambe. Each game was worth one point, with 25 games played in total. Carnforth won the fixture 18 points to 7. A special mention to Theo and Bobby who were unbeaten in all their fixtures. Well done to all the students who were a fantastic representation of the school.







Year 9 Rugby Tournament

On Thursday 19th September, 22 Year 9 boys travelled to Lancaster Royal Grammar School for a rugby tournament. There were five teams at the tournament, including ourselves, LRGS, Our Lady's, QKS and Ripley. The boys won two games vs LRGS and OLCC, drew one game vs QKS and lost one to Ripley. The standard of performance was very high, considering for some of the students it was their first competitive rugby fixture since year 8. The boys were flying in to tackles and rucks to secure the ball, followed by good handling and positive forward running. There were many stand out performances from Theo, Blake, Archie, George, George, Caleb and many others. Well done to the boys on an excellent start to the rugby season.





Year 8 Rugby Tournament

On Thursday 26th September, the Year 8 rugby team hosted the district tournament. 23 players made up the squad to face two teams from Ripley, Central, QES and Morecambe Bay Academy. The boys played 5 competitive fixtures, winning two and losing three. The team worked hard on developing their game, moving the ball wide and trying to exploit the space. This showed as the final game of the tournament was a 5 try to nil victory. Stand out performers were Reece, Dan, Oliver, Joseph, Lucas and Xav. Well done to all 23 boys who represented school on a very wet and windy afternoon.



PE Department Standards and Expectations

A reminder of PE department standards and expectations:

- <u>10 Minute Changing Limit at the start of the lesson.</u> Each pupil must change quickly and within 10 minutes of the start of the lesson.
- <u>Chewing Gum.</u> Pupils must not chew anywhere in school. However, there is particular importance placed on this rule in PE due to the increased risks involved when chewing and doing PE activities.
- **Forgotten kit.** If kit is forgotten a replacement spare kit with be provided by PE and is expected to be worn by pupils. This kit is freshly washed and clean.
- <u>Illness or injury.</u> If a pupil is too ill or injured to take part in PE, a note must be brought from home to excuse them. Their kit <u>must also be brought to school and worn</u> by the pupil at this time. This is because the pupil will still be partaking in some form of the lesson, e.g. referee/coach/equipment manager. They will go outside (if that's where the lesson is) and this will also avoid their school uniform getting dirty or wet (if raining).
- Jewellery. The only jewellery permitted in school is one ring, one plain stud in each and a watch. All of these should be removed for PE without question in order to keep the pupil safe from harm. The exception is recently pierced ears. These may be taped but only for the period needed, then they must be removed. Please do not get ears pierced during term time. This should be done at the start of the 6 week holidays.
- <u>Labelled kit.</u> Please label ALL kit items. They all look the same and it is impossible to identify a lost item of kit and return this to the owner without a name on.



Extra-Curricular Sport

The extra-curricular timetable is now up and running, with a range of clubs on offer at lunch time and after school. Please encourage your son/daughter to attend these clubs. Students will need to bring full PE kit and appropriate footwear for the sport. Fixtures have now started for all clubs and squads will be selected dependant on attendance at extracurricular clubs.

Extra-Curricular Sport Payment

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time electronic payment of £25 to cover their child's annual extracurricular transport payments. Currently the PE department charges £1 for home fixtures and £2 for away fixtures; this covers a percentage of cost for transport and competition fees. Parents will be able to make the payment on the School Gateway. It is hoped that parents find this a preferential method of payment, for those students who are regular team members, rather than paying in cash on the day of the fixtures. Letters with further details can be acquired by your son/daughter from the PE department.
