

This is an event at which students and their parents/carers are invited to attend school for a talk about the Options process as well as the chance to attend four presentations about the choices available to students. This is a very important event as many subjects that are open to the students are not taught at KS3, so you will get to hear from the teachers what the courses are all about! Mr Malone will also be able to share the 'options blocks' at his time, allowing you and your child to understand what combination of subjects they can choose.

Advanced Mathematics Support Programme Visit

On Wednesday 26th February we had an external guest come into school from AMSP (Advanced Mathematics Support Programme) to deliver an interactive session to some of our Year 9 and 10 students.

The session was called "Pizza Palaver," which is a fun look at statistics, post-16 maths and careers.

This enrichment event was designed to inform our students about how maths is used in different careers and to develop and explore mathematical problem-solving skills in real life and fun scenarios.

Students commented on how much they enjoyed the "real-life stories" told and how maths relates to everyday life, such as the statistics and data behind what people pay for their car insurance and why it differs from person to person. They also found it useful to look at "different careers that use maths, that you wouldn't normally think of", and the different options available if you go on to study further maths after GCSE. This included looking at job opportunities, comparing salaries and qualifications available.

The students were very engaged in the session and the external guest commented on the exemplary behaviour and focus across both groups.

Road Passenger Safety Assembly

On 17th March our Year 9 students all had a special assembly with Lancashire County Council around road safety. The '#YOLO' passenger safety workshop was presented in a theatre style. Students explored the consequences of a road traffic tragedy and were encouraged to examine their own attitudes and behaviours and how this would impact on the people they care about the most.

The key objectives of the session for students were to understand the effect their attitude and behaviour has on a driver, their safety and the safety of those around them, to develop greater knowledge of the consequences of anti-social driving, to understand the importance of wearing a seatbelt at all times within in a car, to develop strategies for managing their own behaviour and understand they are never 'just a passenger,' and to equip students with coping strategies to become a powerful and responsible passenger.

Year 10 Work Experience Update

A massive well done to our Year 10 students (and their parents/carers, of course!) for organising their Work Experience placements.

By the initial deadline of 28th February, 75% of students had entered placement details onto Unifrog, and by the extended deadline of 21st March that was up to 83%. This is the best we've ever seen from a year group!

Mr McGauran will now work with remaining students over the next couple of months, trying to help secure placements for the 20 students who do not have details on Unifrog, as well as chasing up paperwork (including proof of insurance and risk assessment) from placements that have agreed to take students.

Year 10 Girls Cricket Tournament

The Year 10 girls netball team travelled to Lancaster Girls Grammar to compete in the District netball tournament last week. Every player put in maximum effort and some even played in positions that were brand new to them during this tournament (due to injury). CHS played MBA to begin, which was a very close match to call. During both halves it was even, with CHS scoring followed by MBA. However, CHS were victorious in their efforts by the end of the second half as they increased their lead by 2 goals in the last two minutes. Final score 7-5 to Carnforth; Player of the Match (POM) Matilda. The next two games were a challenge against RST and LGGS; two players had become injured and unable to play by the end of the second game and therefore this meant 2 players had to switch their positions. CHS missed their GD Lexi and their C/GS Amelia and unfortunately conceded more goals than they would have in both matches; both matches resulted in a loss. With the POM for the Ripley game given to Amelia (pre-injury) and the Girls Grammar game POM to Matilda again. The Year 10 girls came 3rd in the District Tournament, and I look forward to seeing the team playing in next year's tournament when the team is back to their full strength.





Year 9 and 10 Girls Cricket Regional Finals in Bolton

The Year 9 and 10 Girls cricket team attended the regional finals of the ECB Girls U15 schools Indoor Cricket competition last week. This took place at the well-equipped facilities at Bolton Arena. As we arrived and were briefed by the Lancashire cricket coach; were made aware of which school teams we would play in our group and were also very aware of the competitive nature of the tournament and what the next round would hold if CHS made it to National Finals. (The top 2 schools went forward to Nationals).

The girls started extremely well playing against AKS (a Lytham based school) in which CHS won 81-51. Some highlights from this game were: Erin bowling a player out, Maisie catching a player out, Erin hitting a 6, Lexi hitting a 4, and both Erin and Jowita retiring at 15 runs each before they got out, and Erin returning to bat again.

Unfortunately, the next game, which looked to be plain sailing took an unfortunate turn when our first 2 batters got out within the first over, and our third batter was out not much further behind them. Despite this the girls gave it their all, and the following batters knew they had to play it a bit safer and try to gain as many runs as possible. Highlights of this match were Erin bowling the first batter out on her first bat, Lizzie bowling another of their players out, and Erin bowling another player out on the last over. There were also some very good wickets taken during our time fielding. Overall, however the final score was a loss to CHS 68-49.





Year 9 and 10 Girls Cricket Regional Finals in Bolton Continued

The final game in Carnforth's group was against St Michaels school, and we knew this was going to be the hardest game to play so far as they were leaders of the group. The girls went into the match with their game plan in place, batting order and fielding strategies; knowing they had to play it safer when batting than the previous game. Highlights of this match were both Erin H and Erin W hitting a 4, Erin W had to retire after gaining 15 runs, and the communication between CHS fielding was exceptional. Unfortunately, the final score was a loss to CHS 36-78.

At this point CHS initially started packing away ready to return to school, assuming we had not made it to one of the two finals; once all the games in the group stages had been played. However, it was revealed we had made it through to the finals stage/game as we had scored more runs that the other teams and therefore progressed through in second place. This meant that CHS who had come second in our group, played the team that came first place in the other group. This news came with its own challenges, as we had watched this team play, and knew that every player of their team was a club cricket player, and two players played at county level. The girls got stuck in, again had a game plan and stuck to it. Unfortunately, it was not meant to be in the final for CHS. The team (from Bishop Rawsthorpe school) were very experienced and drilled and had very little room for error. CHS played excellently, with some excellent fielding, and batting from all players in our squad. The final score was 34-60 to Bishop. Therefore, we did not progress onto National Finals this time. I would like to congratulate the team for getting to the regional finals, you all played excellently and were positive throughout every match.



Year 9 Bots Football - Lancashire Cup Quarter Final

The Year 9 boys travelled to Burscough Priory Academy for the quarter final of the Lancashire Cup. The game was played at the home of Burscough FC, with both teams getting to play on a fantastic 4G surface with superb facilities. This added some real prestige to what a big game was already.

Carnforth got off to a flying start with captain Theo scoring from inside the area to give the visitors a 1-0 lead. Burscough drew level on the stroke of half time with a strike from the edge of the area fired into the bottom corner. The first half was an even affair with both teams forcing saves from the opposition goalkeeper. Carnforth goalkeeper, Archie, stood up tall twice to make saves from the Burscough attackers. The second half got off to a slow start, with both teams fatiguing under a hot February sun. Mid way through the second half Burscough scored two goals in quick succession to take 3-1 lead. Carnforth fought back and Theo rounded the goalkeeper and slotted cooly into an empty net.

Carnforth threw bodies forward and created three more glorious chances but were unable to find the leveller. Burscough capitalised on this and were very clinical, scoring twice on the break in the final 5 minutes. The final score line was 5-2 to Burscough, and we wish them well in the semi-finals. A tough lesson to learn for the year 9 boys, who were rightly disappointed with the result but will learn and grow as footballers from the experience. Well done boys, quarter finalists of the county cup is a fantastic achievement and one that we will try to better next season.



Year 11 Boys vs Morecambe and Ripley

The year 11 boys travelled to Morecambe Bay Academy to play against both Morecambe and Ripley in the district league. In the first game Morecambe beat Ripley 4-2. The second game was a 4-2 victory for Ripley vs Carnforth. The game was 1-1 at half time, with Tom C scoring from close range for the Carnforth equaliser. Ripley went 4-1 ahead in the second half with an electric 10 minute passage of football. Oliver scored with a superb half volley for Carnforth from the edge of the area to make the final score line 4-2 to Ripley. The final game of the night was a repeat of last year's final, Morecambe v Carnforth. Morecambe took the lead at the end of the first half, scoring a penalty following a handball inside the 6 yard box. Carnforth rallied and were much better second half and scored the goal of the day after full back Harley beat his man with a neat bit of skill, before whipping in an undefendable cross which was met by Oliver who volleyed into the corner of the goal. The final score of the game was 1-1, and both teams shared a point each.



Years 7, 8 and 9 Football Host QKS

On St Patrick's Day, the Year 7, 8 and 9 boys hosted The Queen Katherine School for a round of friendly football fixtures. The year 7s, who are still in the early stages of their Carnforth football careers and developing as a team, made good progress and looked much more organised but fell to a 3-0 defeat. The Year 8 boys lost 4-0, trailing 1-0 at half time in a close first half, but QKS were the stronger side second half and added a further three goals. The Year 9 boys took part in a competitive game, played with good spirits from both sides. Zak gave Carnforth the lead mid-way through the first half, scoring from 25 yards high into the top of the goal. QKS equalised before the stroke of half time, with the QKS centre forward capitalising on a mix up in the Carnforth defence to tap into an empty goal. QKS probably edged the second half, but neither team made a clear-cut chance. With only minutes left on the clock Zak played a defence splitting pass to send through centre forward Kenzie who finished well, under pressure, sending the ball past the QKS goalkeeper into the bottom corner to win the game 2-1 for Carnforth.

Year 10 Boys Football vs Ripley and Year 9 vs Bay Leadership

Year 10 continued their good form with a 6-1 victory at home to Ripley St Thomas. The hosts stormed into an early lead with goals through Alfie B and two from Tom B. Ripley got one goal back just before half time but there was no stopping the Carnforth boys who scored three more times without reply. With goals coming from Alfie, Dan and Nat.

The year 9 boys travelled to Bay Leadership Academy for their second game in two days. Kenzie scored the first goal of the game, mid-way through the first half, heading into a Blake corner at the back post. Carnforth doubled the lead with George finishing off an excellent team move, with a neat left footed finish into the far corner. On the stroke of half time Keyan added a third goal, tapping in at the back post from a deep free kick. Credit to Bay Leadership who continued to pose a threat and scored two quick goals at the start of the second half to make the game 3-2. Both teams missed good chances before Bay Leadership equalised with 10 minutes left on the clock. The final score was 3-3 which means that both teams take a point.



Biggest Football Session Ever

Carnforth High School took part in the biggest football session ever, in collaboration with Barclays, which took place across schools up and down the country on Friday 7th March. The school wanted to see a continuation of the hugely successful sessions that have taken place for the past four years and contributed to record-breaking increases in women's and girls' participation. Taking place, the day before International Women's Day, it will build on last year's success which saw a record-breaking 475,000 girls from 5,000 schools across the country taking part. The week after launching our new women and girls' campaign, 'Made For This Game,' this year's Biggest Ever Football Session will still encourage schools up and down the country to get as many young girls playing football on the same day. Carnforth High School managed to collate 25 girls coming down on Friday 7th March after school, it was great to see so many girls taking part in the session from Years 7-9.

Extra-Curricular Sport Payment

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time electronic payment of £25 to cover their child's annual extracurricular transport payments. Currently the PE department charges £1 for home fixtures and £2 for away fixtures; this covers a percentage of cost for transport and competition fees. Parents will be able to make the payment on the School Gateway. It is hoped that parents find this a preferential method of payment, for those students who are regular team members, rather than paying in cash on the day of the fixtures.
